

The 1967 Censorship Act, which restricted the powers of the Republic's Censorship Board, released 5,000 previously forbidden tomes to the Irish book buying public.

ALTHOUGH born with only the rudiments of arms and legs, the extraordinary Carlowman Arthur Kavanagh became one of the first Europeans to explore central Asia, a feat which he accomplished in the company of a Russian dwarf. He rounded off his career by becoming MP for Carlow.

GALWAY-born Robert Burke walked the 1,500
